SUSTAINABILITY PARADIGM (50 %)

<u>Adaptability</u>, replicability, and scalability (20%)

This criterion includes financial, manufacturing, natural, and human capital.

Feasibility, manageability, and maintainability (30 %)

This indicator factors in social desirability, cultural acceptability, economic





sustainability, technical feasibility, political expediency, operational viability, and neutral or positive environmental impact.

IDEA PARADIGM (50 %)

Originality (25 %)

Here, respect for intellectual property, copyright, and patent come into play. Creativity and inventiveness are also at the core of this component.

Efficiency and Effectiveness (25%)

The project was mobilized using minimal time, effort, and resources. The goals and metrics set were achieved using strategic actions and innovative interventions.

Participants

Qualifications of student representatives

- Bonafide first to third-year college student of partner HEI
- Must be 18-25 years old

Qualifications of educators/professionals

- Must be presently employed in the HEI s/he represents
- Must be 20-45 years old

Roles and Responsibilities of Mentors

A mentor shall:

- 1. provide guidance, motivation, and emotional support during the course of project planning, implementation, and evaluation;
- 2. commit to meeting with mentees on a regular basis (not normally during his/her work time; no less than one hour per week);
- 3. give honest and constructive feedback;
- 4. maintain confidentiality;
- 5. respect mentee's limits and explicitly states one's own limits;
- 6. arrange for a third party to moderate or assist if necessary;
- 7. holds special classes/webinar in coordination with the steering committee;
- 8. maintain a professional relationship that does not intrude on the mentees'

- 9. follow through on the commitments made and ensure the successful completion of the project.
